Scope and Content Note

Helen Warfield Burgess Bebermeyer Seymour (1920-2002) kept many of her mother's papers [Amy Warfield Burgess (1887-1974)]. These papers included wonderful letters from her grandmother, Mary Thomas Snowden Warfield (1861-1932), her great grandmother, Henrietta Stabler Snowden (1829-1907), her great Aunt Mary Thomas Warfield Snowden (1818-1902), and various friends and relations. The correspondences, especially, offer the reader a wonderful insight into family life in the late 19th century. There are five special groupings of note. One is the manuscript diary kept by Mary Thomas Snowden (Warfield). The second is her letters to her aunt, Mary Thomas Warfield Snowden, during her trip to Denver, Colorado in 1882. The third is the series of letters by Henrietta Stabler Snowden to her daughter Mary Thomas Snowden (Warfield). Fourth, is a diary by Mary Thomas Warfield Snowden written in 1858. And fifth, are the three touching letters by Henrietta Stabler Snowden to her mother, Eliza Thomas Stabler (n.d.-n.d.) around the time of the death of her husband, Lt. Nicholas Snowden (1828-1862), at the battle at Harrisonburg, Virginia. The collection also contains documents dealing with family weddings, deaths, genealogical materials and notes on purchases as well as wonderful family photos and intriguing scrapbooks.

Processing Notes:

Helen Seymour's son, James E. Bebermeyer, who had the power of attorney to settle his mother's affairs, donated the original materials. These materials arrived at Montpelier in 2003. The staff then reviewed the materials to determine what was appropriate to keep. Other family members also wanted to review the materials to determine what would be appropriate for them to keep. In the end, materials related to the Snowden family's time at Montpelier and other items appropriate for facilitating future genealogical research were kept. The family members took the remaining materials from the trunk and the trunk itself.

It is important to note that in the confusion of reviewing the materials, much of the original organization was lost. Because of this, in processing this collection, every effort was made to try to recreate the original organization and to make the materials as accessible as possible. In some cases, the best that could be done was to place the letters by a single author to a single recipient in month and day order only since many letters do not note the year. Also, every effort was made to match up envelopes with the appropriate letter. In some cases, it was impossible to do. And every effort was made to identify the people involved in the correspondence. In a few cases, that determination will be left up to the researcher. Also, in cases where the date is undetermined these

letters were placed in the back of the folder. Again it will be left up to the researcher to determine for him or herself the possible date.

To improve care and increase access to content for researchers every effort was made to unfold the letters to their full extent. There are a few exceptions and this will be noted in the Folder List. Where noted, please ask a staff person to help you handle the materials. Also, there are some items that are a bit fragile such as the scrapbooks and a few of the booklets. Again the condition of these items is noted in the Folder List. Please note that a wide strip of acid free white paper has been used to keep groups of letters and related materials together. Please pick up the groupings with the white strip to keep the batches together. Do not separate.

In addition, family members came to research the materials. During their research activities they were permitted to write on the original documents. In some cases during the creation of the finding aid, these notes were removed so as not to violate the integrity of the original document. However, in other cases, where this could not be done, a note has been written in the folder listing warning the researcher of this problem.

Finally, rather than change the names of people involved as they marry I have chosen to use the name that most readily identifies them for most of the length of the correspondence. For example, Helen Snowden and her sister Mary Thomas Snowden, daughters of Lt. Nicholas Snowden and Henrietta Snowden, have their names written Helen Snowden (Stabler) and Mary Thomas Snowden (Warfield) respectively to denote their future or contemporary married state. As for Henrietta Snowden, her name is denoted as Henrietta Stabler Snowden since we do not have any correspondence from her when she was unmarried. There are two exceptions to this. Mary Thomas Warfield Snowden is denoted only this way, although there are a few letters written to her before her marriage to Edward Snowden. Lucy Snowden is denoted as Lucy Snowden (Lea) since this covers most of the correspondence with a few letters written after her marriage to William W. Moore in 1908. The goal of this choice was to make it as clear as possible as to who was involved in the correspondence.

Series Description:

The collection has been divided into six series. These series are described below:

Series I: DIARIES AND CORRESPONDENCE

In this series, manuscript diaries (bound diaries are found in another series) and general correspondences were organized according to the people involved so that it will make it easier for the researcher to follow the correspondences between creator and the recipient. The first is a general manuscript diary written by Mary Thomas Snowden (Warfield) and an additional manuscript diary from her aunt, Mary Thomas Warfield Snowden. Next, are the correspondence between Mary Thomas Snowden (Warfield) and Mary Thomas Warfield Snowden during the former's trip to Colorado in 1882. After this are their correspondences before and after this trip. The organization then focuses on the letters to and from Mary Thomas Snowden (Warfield) as well as one letter to

her husband Charles Dorsey Warfield. Then, we have the correspondence to and from Mary Thomas Warfield Snowden as well as her husband Edward Snowden. Next, are the correspondence related to Henrietta Stabler Snowden. Finally, there are three older letters from the 1830s and 1840s and a few unidentified letters.

Series II: PHOTOGRAPHS

In this series, we have individual photos of various Snowden/Warfield Family members. Images include Mary Thomas Snowden (Warfield) in Colorado and a framed photo of Clara Warfield, sister of Amy Warfield Burgess.

Series III: GENEALOGY AND PERSONAL MATERIALS

In this series, there are items related to family events (wedding invitations, wedding gift lists, death notices), handwritten genealogical notes, manuscript of a story written by one of the family members, and a long prayer written by Mary Thomas Snowden (Warfield).

Series IV: MISCELLANEOUS

This series contains items that did not necessarily fit well into any other series. Items found in this collection include loose items, some of which possibly fell out of a letter or scrapbook. It also contains receipt of purchases as well as an interesting note about the National Fair in 1846.

Series V: BOOKLETS, BOOKS, PHOTO ALBUMS AND SCRAPBOOKS

This series contains magazines and booklets as well as bound books, a family bible, genealogy reference materials, a bound diary, a photo album and scrapbooks created by family members.

Series VI: ITEMS ADDED AFTER 2009

This series contains one letter. Please see Folder List for more details.

For certain diaries and correspondence, a descendant, Carolyn Warfield Scheele Fakadej, along with her mother's cousin, Jean Warfield Keenan, transcribed several of the letters and diaries. These are:
